Sigiriya Aebischer Perone, MD, works at the division of Tropical and Humanitarian Medicine at the Geneva University Hospitals and the ICRC's Health Unit, with clinical, project management and training activities focusing on challenges in fragile environments.



Alex van Duinen has been trained in the Netherlands as a medical doctor in global health and tropical medicine. In 2011, he started working in Sierra Leone as the medical officer in charge of Masanga hospital and participated in the start-up of a surgical task-sharing program supported by the Norwegian NGO CapaCare. He is currently working as a surgical resident at St Olavs Hospital in Trondheim Norway while completing a PhD regarding quality of surgical care related to task-sharing.



Johan von Schreeb, MD, PhD has more than 25 years experience of responding to disasters worldwide. He is the founder of Médecins Sans Frontières in Sweden and leads the centre for research on health care in disasters at Karolinska Institutet, which is a WHO collaborating centre on research and teaching on global disaster medicine.



Siri Tellier, MSc (Harvard School of Public Health/population sciences) is the course leader for the University of Copenhagen course on Health in Emergencies and Refugee Health. Before that she has had 40 years of experience in international health with UNFPA, UNDP and Danish Red Cross.
